Dear Parents and friends of the McCarthy community

The first term has flown by so quickly at McCarthy where the learning is at the heart of all we say and do. What a great start to the year it has been in 2019! I started the year by sending our 'Welcome back' letter which you all would have received in Week 1 of this term through the Skoolbag App. We have made some important decisions based on your continued and highly valued feedback on how we communicate all information regarding our learning community. The following changes have been implemented during 2019:

- Our McCarthy Newsletter will come out each term with a Welcome back letter at the start of each year to each year group. This will cover the major events around student learning and faith formation.
- Other events that occur during the term will be promoted at the time of the event for parents and the wider community through the use of social media such as Facebook and Twitter. Our news can be seen close to the time of the event and at the point of need.
- Skoolbag will be used to communicate urgent and important critical information such as Parent Teacher interviews, medical alerts, etc. All parents should have this app and ensure it is set to receive notifications.

### Opening Mass

We welcome Fr Paul Roberts to McCarthy Catholic College as the new Parish Priest for Our Lady of the Way Emu Plains. Fr Paul celebrated our Opening School Mass which was indeed very special emphasising that we are all neighbours and need to be continuously looking out and caring for each other in our community, and even reaching beyond. ## **School Goals**

At McCarthy we have the following goals for 2019:

Formation, RE and Mission Goal: To model Mary MacKillop's value of reaching out to one's neighbour witnessed in the learning and lived out as Faith in Action.

Literacy Goal: For Year 7-10 students to improve their reading and writing through the implementation of school wide practices in reading and writing.

Numeracy Goal: For Year 7-10 students to improve their numeracy achievement (NAPLAN) through the implementation of Maths specific and school wide instructional practices for decoding questions.

Our focus throughout the year in all subjects will be to improve students ability to write with purpose and precision. Teachers have worked closely with students during Term 1 to focus on pen to paper writing and not simply relying upon the use of technology to respond in written form. We have already seen an increase in the amount students are writing as they build their writing skills and the quality of student writing is now the next stage of focus in Term 2. Teachers are providing feedback and will now be working in partnership with students to learn how to appraise peers and provide critical feedback to further improve the standard. Congratulations to all students who have commenced the year with workbooks that are well presented and organised.

#### PARENT HINT AND SUPPORT

<u>Parents:</u> Please encourage your child to read for 15-30 minutes each night if they are in Years 7-10. Research shows a strong link between the improvement in reading leading to benefits and gains in a student's writing ability. Reading prior to going to sleep can also help establish a healthy bedtime routine by detoxing from technology. We have recently bought many new books that come with high recommendations to engage adolescents in reading. There are a range of books and genres from crime, to romance, to drama and many new non-fiction books of interest. ## **Student Learning Performance Grade (SLP)**

Students receive their SLP every 5 weeks and these are then communicated to parents. Please use this framework to discuss your child's learning with them and help them understand what they need to work on to improve their standard next term. Scores between 22-25 indicate outstanding learning progress and deserve high commendation.

## Junior and Senior Inquiry Hubs

Our new learning Hubs are now officially open and are the centre of great collaboration for all classes who have the opportunity to learn in this outstanding agile learning space. I have been particularly impressed with English and HSIE classes in Year 7 and 8 who have been engaging in Inquiry Based and Project Based Learning and effectively learning with teachers and peers.







### **Uniform Shop**

There have been some issues with our supplier and some challenges receiving orders. School Locker is directly responsible for these issues and has sent a Skoolbag apology stating that there will be an improvement in their commitment to meet orders and stock demands. #### **Year 10 Learning as Senior Students**

Wearing the senior uniform is a very small part of developing the learning behaviours and commitment to study of a senior student and our Year 10 students are certainly making a positive change to their engagement in learning and their overall organisation of assessment work which has been very impressive indeed.

This year we expect to see a progression towards taking full responsibility for their learning with the guidance and support of their teachers who are expecting much more from them now as Year 10 seniors who are meeting the award of the Record of School Achievement (RoSA). Year 10 students have their Assessment Schedules and are aware of the times throughout the year where assessment in each course will contribute towards their RoSA grade at the end of Year 10. This will certainly be great preparation for the HSC pathway study next year. Year 10 will be a stepping stone to Year 11 with many of the key skills in learning management and organisation instilled in Year 10 to ensure that they are ready for HSC expectations.

Year 10 will also have the benefit of a **Study and Learning Skills Day** in Term 2 to empower them to learn effectively and achieve to their potential. Keep up the great work Year 10, you are an incredible group of young people who will achieve outstanding results if you continue to focus and work in partnership with your teachers throughout the year. Your final grade issued by NESA as your RoSA grade reflects your standard of work based on the assessment and class work you have produced as the evidence of your learning progress. Please work hard and you will be very satisfied with the RoSA grade you will achieve and earn!

#### Year 11 and 12 Student Learning

Our Stage 6 Senior students have made a wonderful start to the year. Year 11 TTC students have students have completed their first industry placement receiving very pleasing and encouraging feedback from their employers! Congratulations to all students who engaged wholeheartedly with their employer and received pleasing feedback as part of this valuable extension of their TTC learning package.

Year 11 Main school have commenced with a very positive mindset and working with peers well on class tasks. The key to success in Year 11 and 12 is very much dependent on consistency of effort and being goal focused. Mr Stein our Head of Student Wellbeing will work closely with our students to ensure that they are well supported and can achieve to their absolute best.

Year 12 participated in their Retreat day at the Franciscan Shrine Of the Holy Innocents, Kellyville and this has allowed them to continue to find God in all things around them and feel his presence in their everyday life knowing they are always loved by God. 
Thank you to everyone for your continued support of our wonderful college. May the Easter joy fill your heart and the Spirit of our risen Lord awaken your heart.

## FROM THE COLLEGE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL

Dear members of the McCarthy community

Whilst reflecting on this great term I am proud to think of all the ways, this term, that we are building connections with our students, families and community. Later in this newsletter entry, I will link all of our activities and events this term to our College Religious Education Action goal and today's parable about the Prodigal Son about how we each belong.

At the start of the year, we welcomed our new Year 7 students, new teachers and students with orientation programs and all the College settled well with their first days and weeks back at school. We went through lessons in homeroom and our new classrooms, to help us be the best we can be by organising ourselves and looking at the new McCarthy learning points to guide our merit system.

Teachers in our Parramatta Diocese have moved to a new online file system and with this, we can give merit points for great learning and service to our community when entering data for our students. Alternatively, when things get off track and lessons are being learnt about negative behaviours, points can be deducted. Every 5 weeks students who achieve an overall average of ≥ 22/25 on their **Student Learning Performance report** (that is sent home and stuck in every students diary during homeroom after being signed by their parent/s) gain 7 McCarthy points. I am very happy to see so many of our students increasing their points and moving from the starting level of 4 up to Level 5 and further. At the Semester 1 and 2 award ceremony we plan to give certificates and rewards to students whose learning and service is meritorious. You may remember that Semester 2 2018, students who achieved higher levels were invited by our Principal Leader to a movie afternoon. Everyone is capable of doing their best in their learning and it is not too late to refocus.

At our opening liturgy Mr Feeney, our RE teachers, our College Captains and Vice Captains and talented musicians and sound crew led us beautifully as we welcomed our new Parish Priest, Fr Paul Roberts and were filled with hope to connect more deeply to one another and be kind to one another. We introduced our College action goal for religious education and mission: To model, Mary MacKillop's value of reaching out to one's neighbour evidenced across the learning and lived out as Faith in Action.

We have joined together as students, families and teachers in Year 10 and Year 11 to learn more about assessment rules and procedures, as well as meeting all our new families during the Year 7 Meet and Greet night. Mrs Cairns and I had the honour of taking amazing Year 11 Student representatives to meet Stage 3 students at our local Catholic Primary schools and then we had the most fabulous Open Night, during Catholic Schools week, where our school and learning were showcased. We had more than 600 people visit. Everyone loved looking at our new contemporary learning spaces in the TAS area, Senior Learning Hub and Junior Learning Hub. **Enrolments for Year 7 2020 are due on Friday 5th April** to our College Reception. I hope no one misses out on a place at our College, so it's best to submit your enrolment form ASAP.

Our **Swimming Carnival** was so colourful and the whole school enjoyed competing, cheering for one another and celebrating friendships. Mr Luchetti, our PDHPE team and our Sports Captains guided us all to try our best and enjoy the day. I especially loved comments from our parents on the day about how proud and happy they were that their children belong to the McCarthy learning community.

Year 7 went on a very special camp to Kincumber and Year 11 and 12 also grew in their connections to one another and their faith relationship with God during their respective Reflection Days. We welcomed, made friends and farewelled our Japanese students who visited and Mr Sullivan worked extremely hard with our partnering exchange schools teachers to provide excellent opportunities for all students and teachers.

We learnt more about one another and how learning is progressing during our Year 11 and 12 Parent/Teacher interviews last week and reports for Year 12 will be coming home before the end of Term 1.



Sitting at my Parish Church recently, I listened to the story of the Prodigal Son: Luke 15:11-32 and I heard something new in the Priests homily. In the parable, we hear about a father who divides what he owns and gives money to a younger son who decides to leave the family. This younger son travels far away, lives beyond his means and runs out of money for food and struggles to survive.

He returns home. His father rejoices. In this parable, Jesus is telling us that when we are sinners and are doing things with our money and friends that God doesn't like it's like we have left Him, like the son that left home.



## **HEAD OF INNOVATION AND DIVERSITY**

At McCarthy we value learning that is authentic, individualised, interconnected, diverse and responsive to student needs. Last year a key focus of Teacher Professional Learning was student literacy, with a real focus on implementing whole school strategies to improve student comprehension. Following significant improvement in reading comprehension across Stage 4 to 5, this year Teacher Professional Learning has been extended to a focus on writing as an essential literacy skill for life. We know that when students have multiple exposure to different text types, receive explicit teaching, have repeated access to writing samples of high, middle and low achievement and are given multiple opportunities to write, receive feedback and re-write, then writing success follows.

Complimenting our whole school approach to literacy is our targeted intervention in literacy and numeracy in stage 4. These programs support learners through intensive and highly individualised programs known as R3 and EMU. These lessons occur daily and rely upon targeted and very rigorous tasks that challenge students to learn and apply new skills and strategies. It has been wonderful to see students engage with these course and each other. These rich opportunities provide solid foundations for our students as they transition to high school and learning to transfer their learning across all subjects.
